LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As I reflect on the outstanding past year we had, and imagine countless new opportunities to provide unbridled hope and healing in the years to come, four words come to mind: Big dreams and bigger blessings.

Last year we were blessed to **serve 1,597** individuals through 6,700 lessons in therapeutic riding, equine-assisted learning and unique one-time camp experiences. We were able to help them find hope and unlock their potential at the barn and beyond. None of this would be possible without **over 500** volunteers who show up to side walk, horse handle, clean lots, care for the horses, help keep our facilities clean, and so much more. One of the biggest blessings was the \$1,052,443 raised through fundraising to provide rider scholarships, program support, facility maintenance and horse care.

Last year, we continued to see a tremendous increase in the demand for therapeutic riding and equine-assisted learning. As more and more people come to Agape for help, our passion for guiding them to the discovery of the wonderment of horses has also increased. It is this passion that inspires our four words: Big dreams and bigger blessings.

Over the last three years we have been able to see dreams come true at our East Greenfield location by investing over \$200,000 in facility improvements—all thanks to generous grants from local foundations.

Perhaps our biggest dream, officially launched in 2022, was our "Beyond the Barn" capital campaign. We have already been blessed with donations totaling \$3.5 million dollars towards our \$16 million goal to expand our mission delivery and serve the ever growing needs of the community through our future home at the Stonycreek Farm property in Noblesville. Once completed, this new facility will allow us to:

- · create 2 indoor riding arenas for year-round programming,
- · have 47 acres and modern facilities to have 20+ horses and expand the number of individuals served,
- · ample outdoor arena riding space along with wooded trails,
- and be the gold-standard for PATH Premier Accredited Therapeutic Riding Centers in the United States!

As we move through the final design process of this new space and the fundraising that needs to take place, we will be eager to engage you in conversation.

But the dreams and blessings we are most grateful for are those of our riders and partners. None of this would be possible without the generous support of people like YOU! Whether the challenge is large or small, we know that every smile and each laugh at the barn is a well-earned celebration of accomplishing a goal and realizing their potential. Those moments are the biggest blessings of all and we cannot wait to be a part of more of those moments in 2023!







KEATON'S STORY

Keaton was born with a congenital heart defect known as Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome in which the left side of his heart was severely underdeveloped. Simply put, Keaton was born with half of a heart. He has undergone three open-heart surgeries and numerous procedures. Following his first surgery, Keaton suffered 2 strokes. Because of the significant damage from his strokes he now suffers from epilepsy and faces a number of challenges daily. He is a true warrior.

Recently, Keaton has struggled with anxiety and has lacked confidence in his ability to overcome challenges. Because of this, we pursued an opportunity at Agape. There are truly not enough words to describe the

impact that riding has had on Keaton's confidence.

Keaton now believes that he can do "hard things;" a mantra that his incredible Agape Instructor, Miss Dana, has him repeat each week at the barn. Keaton's love and respect for his horse, Lexi, is something that warms my heart. He truly adores her and the bond they share is honestly indescribable.

We are forever thankful for Agape, for Lexi, for the volunteers and for the confidence Keaton has gained while riding. Keaton has been able to carry over the lessons and values learned while riding into his daily life and continues to believe he can do "hard things."

Many years ago, Doneta (Agape Director of Finance) gave a presentation about Agape at a meeting of the professional association to which we both belonged. THE REFUGE CENTRAL INDIANA TEEN CHALLENGE'S STORY

A group of our girls visit Agape once every other week. They love it so much. They really enjoy getting out of the house and getting to learn different things. They do not just learn about horses, they learn a lot of life skills. They learn what it takes to be a good teammate and to be loving and gentle with one another as they are with the horses. I can attest that when the girls come home from Agape they are in such a lighter mood and are so excited to tell us about what they learned that day. They love sharing their personal experiences with the horses and really enjoy the fact that the staff there love them back! Agape is an amazing place for our teen girls to expand their horizons and they learn something new every time they go. I am very happy The Refuge gets to be a part of Agape and their teachings. We as staff also enjoy that they get to be creative and learn different ways of communicating with each other and do team activities. Some of the girls go not knowing anything about horses and they come home raving about how much fun they had and how they enjoyed being around the horses and they can't wait to go back.

Working with Agape has brought a unique aspect to The Refuge that has affected the students in a beautiful way. As a program that is focused on helping teenage girls through all sorts of debilitating obstacles, we have been able to see the impact that this source of therapy brings. They are able to love on the gentle horses which helps them relax and unwind. When I observe the students in a session, they are challenged to pay attention to body language in order to achieve goals with the horses they work with. They practice communicating patiently with one another, organizing group activities, and problem solving, which is important in relation to the way that they treat one another in our home. We love to see the girls united and when they go to Agape, we see them lift each other up and come together. We are grateful for this organization, and I know our ladies are grateful as well!

Agape has helped The Refuge Teen Challenge and me in so many ways. I used to be very passive-aggressive, I didn't have any boundaries, and I didn't know how to let my emotions show in a healthy manner. When I first heard about horse therapy I was very against it. I didn't think horses could help me, but I learned they could.

We go to Agape every other Monday. When we get there we go into a classroom and learn a character trait. We talk about how we either have used the character trait or could. After we discuss it, we go and get the horses. We go into the arena, and do a group activity. The group activity uses the character traits with the horses to put it into practice.

In horse therapy we develop character traits, healthy relationships with the horses and others, and better mental health.

I've learned the importance of being assertive, having boundaries, and correctly expressing my emotions. Agape Horse Therapy has brought freedom through Jesus in a very creative and effective way.

Imagine this: It's early morning at Agape East. The sun has risen and it's shining brightly over the fields. Campers will be arriving in a few hours for a boisterous day of summer camp, but right now the only activity is horses eager to eat breakfast. No one is more eager than Beau and Duke Wonderhorse. They both crowd around their gate, Beau nickering and tossing his head while Duke rolls back his upper lip in his signature smile. They are excited about breakfast, but they enjoy the company of their people almost as much. Once breakfast is done, they will gladly come up to the grooming area to get ready for camp. They will then greet camper after camper with the same goofy smile or little head shake before settling into their routine with the kids.

That snapshot really does sum up the two blonde boys, as they were sometimes called. Beau and Duke Wonderhorse served as therapeutic riding horses for a combined total of 16 years—8 years each! They started their service in 2014 with Edelweiss. Even back then, they would sometimes spend winters with Agape because Edelweiss didn't offer classes in the winter. When Edelweiss became Agape East in 2017, Beau and Duke Wonderhorse came right along for the ride. And what a glorious ride it's been! Duke truly was a Wonderhorse in classes-he was the horse instructors

could depend on to carry riders with the highest needs, or who were working to overcome anxiety or fear. He was patient with them, would help them find balance, and even move under them to help them stay in the saddle. Beau always made the smallest riders beam with pride and confidence as they completed tasks that may have been too challenging on bigger horses. He was steady, knew his job, and helped multiple children reach independence.

Beau and Duke Wonderhorse, thank you for many years of service! We hope you enjoy retirement together for many years to come.
